# **Enteric (Food-/Water-borne) Diseases**

#### **INCREASING CASES**

As the weather warms, so too increases the number of cases of foodand water-borne illness. There were 133 reports of enteric infections between April and June this year in the district, with the most common pathogens being Campylobacter (57 confirmed), Salmonella (46 confirmed), and Hepatitis A (1 confirmed). Notably, however, cases of Vibrio and Yersinia have also increased from 0 to 6 and 1 to 5, respectively, from the first quarter to the second.

#### **ENTERIC DISEASE PREVENTION**

The best way of stopping the spread of foodborne illness is to practice proper hand hygiene each time your hands may be contaminated in addition to before food preparation and after using the restroom. When ill, you should stay home, rest, and wait for symptoms to stop or when public health officials say you may return to your normal activities. This is especially true for those working in childcare and/or in healthcare. Ensure your food is cooked thoroughly to kill any remaining microorganisms, and don't prepare ready-to-eat items in the same area as raw meat to avoid cross-contamination. ## **Tuberculosis (TB) Infections**

Some areas of the district have seen increased rates of TB in the last quarter. Risk factors for TB exposure include prolonged exposure to someone with active TB or current/former residence and/or extended travel to countries where TB is common.

#### WHAT IS TB?

TB is a serious infectious disease that commonly affects the lungs but can impact any part of the body. The bacteria spreads through the air when someone with active pulmonary TB infection coughs, sneezes, talks, or sings. A latent TB infection can become active at any time.

#### SYMPTOMS, TREATMENT, & PREVENTION

Signs of active TB can include weight loss, fever, night sweats, loss of appetite, and fatigue. There may also be a persistent cough lasting 3+ weeks, blood from coughing, and chest pain. Those with active TB will usually have symptoms, an abnormal chest x-ray, and a positive culture or PCR test for TB. Both latent and active TB can be treated with antibiotics available at all District 2 health departments. Treatment is needed to prevent serious illness or death, development of drug-resistant TB, and further spread of the disease. # **Sexually Transmitted Infections (STIs)**

Recently, GA DPH released a health advisory on adult and congenital syphilis. Rates have notably increased among women of reproductive age and newborns. In District 2, communicable disease specialists (CDS) and other epidemiologists are reaching out to patients and community members to test for this infection and treat individuals who are positive for syphilis.

The CDS Team joined three events (05/23, 06/10, & 06/28) and collaborated with other programs and departments such as HIV Prevention and Adolescent Health & Youth Development, to distribute rapid syphilis test kits, condoms, and educational materials to the community. Remember: All county health departments in District 2 offer comprehensive and confidential TB and STI services!


